MOMENTUM

When I was sixteen, I wanted to get my driver's license. In fact, everyone my age wanted to be able to drive a car. This was freedom and another step toward being grown up and being at large in the world. My Dad began to teach me to drive and gave me his speech. It went something like this: "When you are driving a car, you are pushing 4000 pounds of metal down a highway, and when you take your foot off the gas, it's not going to stop. So, you had better be thinking ahead, because if you hit something it is going to do a lot of damage." The talk was probably longer, but what my Dad was concerned with was momentum.

In physics Momentum is equal to Mass times Velocity -- P = M(V). That is 4000 lbs. traveling 60 miles/hour equals 351,885 lb-ft/sec. The unit conversions cause the result not to be a straightforward multiplication problem, but it tells us that momentum can be a lot of something; whether we are talking about the momentum of a car or church. In a car you can take your foot off the gas, but the car will keep going whether you are driving on a road or driving through a corn field. (Driving through a corn field doesn't work well --ask my daughter)

Sometimes the question isn't how we are going, but where are we going. I think we must watch out for momentum. The young people of today are wonderful, but they are different then the people of a generation or two back. There are a lot of younger people who don't care to learn to drive. Many live at home longer and put off moving out into the world. They grew up with technology that older people either must learn or sometimes shun. They are internet ready and even dependent. They are multimedia and satellite programed. I grew up with a small black and white tv set and four or five channels if it was a good day. The younger generation has Imax, hundreds of channels,

internet streaming, and social media that connects them with the world and people they don't even really know. They can join an online game and talk to friends in other states while playing. I would also say they spirit toward people who are different and perhaps even a greater sense of justice for others. This doesn't mean the world is essentially better or that there are not negative consequences in the use of technology, but I do think that our children are what we have led them to be. That are who they are because we were their parents and grandparents.

The question that comes from this: Is the church intentionally driving in a direction to meet and greet the generations that are moving into the world, or are we letting our momentum simply carry us along to our own happy places. Are we content to be content, or should we be painfully aware of how much the message of Christ is still needed in the lives of young people today, and actively trying to find ways to accommodate and speak to this wonderfully higher tech, internet savvy, socially aware, full on CGI generation of today?

I think we need to watch out for momentum. The church isn't a church unless we are giving it away. What we keep we will lose and what we lose shall be kept. Jesus simply said take up your cross and follow me. Perhaps Jesus' way is the opposite of simple momentum. Jesus gave away everything in faith that God would breathe life into our world through even his death. I wonder what this should mean to us.



In the United States, Christians share their perspective about the meaning of Pentecost as well as how the diversity of languages and cultures can enhance their worship and fellowship with each another. Christians see Pentecost as an expansion of God's favor and care from Judaism to all peoples.

As recorded in the New Testament of the Bible, it was on the 50th day after Easter that the apostles were praying together, and the Holy Spirit descended on them. They received the "gift of tongues" – the ability to speak in other languages – and immediately began to preach about Jesus Christ to Jewish people from all over the world who flocked to Jerusalem for the Feast of Shavuot

Christian Pentecost became not only a commemoration of the Holy Spirit's visit but also marks the birth of the Christian Church. Although it is not certain when Pentecost began to be observed by Christians, it may have been early as the first century. According to church tradition, Pentecost is always about seven weeks after Easter Sunday, or 50 days after Easter, including Easter Day.

The symbols of Pentecost are those of the Holy Spirit and include flames, wind, and a dove. Wear **RED** to church on June 9.

The history of Father's Day



The American Father's Day was introduced at the start of the 20th century, following the successful promotion of Mother's Day by Anna Jarvis.

It was reputedly first marked on July 5, 1908 in West Virginia – also the birthplace of Mother's Day – by Grace Clayton, who had recently lost her father in a mining accident.

Two years later, a more widespread Father's Day commemoration took place across churches in Spokane, Washington organized by Sonora Dodd, who had been

inspired by attending a Mother's Day service the previous year.

The Administrative Council Meeting was held on Sunday, May 19, 2019 after worship services. Pastor Russell opened the meeting with a prayer. Minutes of the last meeting were read; approved.

CURRENT BUSINESS:

- 1. Arts & Crafts Show May 18. L. Taghon Laurie reported that turnout was good for the arts & crafts fair. There was some difficulty finding vendors and tables. We have added to our vendor list for next year. Gift baskets produced better income than vendor samples. Gross income to date: \$1,626.50
- 2. **Benefit Dinner for Sandi Flack** S. Mallory The Pulled Pork Dinner (with Cole slaw, baked beans, dessert & beverage) will be held **Friday, May 31, 5:00 to 7:00 PM.** Please sign up on the sheet in fellowship hall.
- 3. **Farwell/Welcome for Pastors** Farwell Dinner for Pastor Russell and family will be June 9, after worship. Please plan to attend; Welcome reception for Pastor Melody to be determined.
- 4. Parsonage Work Trustees S. Palmer Roger and Sue did a walk-thru of the parsonage. Work will begin on June 19; Sue will prepare a spreadsheet with work assignments to be filled, along with work materials needed and email to everyone. Major work includes tearing out all carpet in the house and installing new flooring; updating bathrooms, painting rooms, etc. Please volunteer we need your help. Pastor Melody moves in on the 27th. Sue talked with a representative from Floor Covering Brokers and the luxury vinyl flooring will cost approximately \$11,913 (materials & labor). Money for parsonage repairs will come out of the Endowment fund. A \$200 donation for work expenses was given today.
- 5. **Parsonage Yard Clean-up** R. Noonan is in charge of clean-up on **Wednesday, May 22 at 6:30 PM.** Please bring your own tools and gloves. Church grounds to be done at a later date.

- Annual Conference Lay Representative Roy Pentilla is attending and will represent EUMC at the annual conference on May 30-June 2 at Grand Traverse Resort, Acme.
- Staff Pastor Parish Relations Roger Noonan reported there have been two responses so far for the secretary's position. He and Jan Lyon will set up interviews with the applicants and that Pastor Melody would like to be there too.
- Trustees Tim Egeler has been hired to do lawn service at the church and parsonage at \$175/month.
- **Financial** Carole Merillat, chair (by phone) reported that the finance team is working on a 5-year plan and the stewardship campaign. - Other: The road clean up was completed. Thanks to Jim Fowler and crew.
