A Talented organist before the days of motor-driven or electric organs gave a magnificent concert in which the big pipes sent forth glorious, thunderous tones. After people finished congratulating him, the little boy who had worked away with all his might at the bellows behind the curtain remarked, "We did pretty well, don't you think?"

The organist disdainfully replied, "And what did you do?" He gave the boy no credit at all.

A month later, during another concert, the organist came to a stormy passage that required all the wind of which the bellows were capable. Suddenly the organ began to fade away. The organist signaled for more wind. Just then the little lad pulled aside the curtain and bargained, "then shall it be 'we'?" (Flynn, Leslie B., 19 Gifts of the Spirit, p. 9)

As the church and as individuals, we are something like that organ. To play our music we must be filled by the Spirit's wind. Without God's presence the notes of life fall flat and silent. At Pentecost, God breathed his life and nature into all who would ask. As we live life understanding the "we" that we are a part of, our lives are blessed.

This realization that we are never really alone in this life and that God is present, brought the Apostle Paul to remind people of the manifestation of God within their lives. Paul spoke of the existence of Spiritual gifts. You are gifted, and these gifts of the Spirit are present for the building up of the Body of Christ. The gifts of the Spirit are present for the good of others. In Christ you become a gift for another.

As we move through the next few weeks, in my preaching we are going to be considering the Spiritual Gifts, and how they lead us toward service within the church. What are your spiritual gifts? How has God blessed you, and how are you most able to be a blessing to others? I want us to think about the meaning of our church membership in light of our spiritual gifts.

By the time you read this you may have already received an email from me giving you the opportunity to begin discerning your spiritual gifts, and to share this information with me. As we learn from one another my hope is that the knowledge we gain may help the church in discerning our lay leadership needs. Part of this email is a link to a 21 question spiritual assessment (http://www.umc.org/what-we-believe/spiritual-gifts-online-assessment). You may use this shorter assessment or use a longer questionnaire (140 questions) at http://www.kodachrome.org/spiritgift/. Email your results from the longer test to pastor_empireumc@centurytel.net. Also I do have printed copies of the longer questionnaire. These are available in the back of the church or you may ask me for one. You may use these results (rather than the shorter questionnaire) to answer the questions in my email if you wish, but I think the shorter survey may be easier and about as informative as the longer survey.

I invite you to be a part of these weeks of learning and spiritual growth, as we reaffirm together how we are blessed and how God has filled our lives with the Spirit's wind. Come and be part of this process as we discern God's call and the Spirit's desire for your life. Let us celebrate and use the gifts that God has given us.

What do you think?

- 1. There are four basic lists of spiritual gifts in the New Testament: Romans 12:6-8, 1 Corinthians 12:4-11, 1 Corinthians 12:28, Ephesians 4:11. How many individual gifts are listed in these passages? Does this represent all the spiritual gifts?
- 2. Are spiritual gifts different than the Fruit of the Spirit from Galatians 5:22-23?
- 3. Do the spiritual gifts always persist or do they end?
- 4. Does everyone have a spiritual gift and can a person have more than one?
- 5. What are your spiritual gifts?

6 Methodist historical figures

The history of The United Methodist Church is filled with deeply spiritual people like <u>John Wesley</u>, people who devoted their lives to the cause of Christ. We stand upon their lives and work; they continue to challenge us. Here are the stories of six Methodists that you can use in your lessons to help others hear the voice of God.

Fannie Crosby

Though her name may not be familiar to modern worshippers, her words are among the most well-known in all Christianity. Fannie Crosby penned over 9,000 hymns. While her songs like <u>Blessed</u>
Assurance became popular among many denominations, Crosby was a lifelong Methodist.

WHO WILL TELL the OLD, OLD STORY?

At the same time she was sharing her incredible musical gifts, Crosby lived a life characterized by hope and generosity. She followed Wesley's example regarding possessions, constantly giving away all but what was required for her survival.

Blinded by a treatment prescribed by a man pretending to be a doctor, Crosby could easily have become bitter. Instead, she chose a different path and wrote that her blindness allowed her to enjoy blessings that other people could not.

John Fletcher

When faced with the question of who would lead the Methodist movement after his death, Wesley had one person in mind: <u>John Fletcher</u>. Though Fletcher died before Wesley, his considerable skill as a theologian helped craft the formidable works that included Wesley's world-shaping ideals.

A prolific writer, Fletcher's pursuit of God provides a powerful example for the 21st-century church. It was during a small group gathering that Fletcher shared that he believed he had received the gift of entire sanctification. He went on to say that he had received it twice before but lost it because of false humility and failure to share the news of the incredible gift with others. His teaching: When God does something for us; we must not shy away from praising to God and sharing what God has done.

Sojourner Truth

Born Isabella Baumfree, she grew up as a slave in New York. She escaped in 1862, a year before Abraham Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation. A courageous and formidable woman, she took a slave owner in Alabama to court to get her son out of slavery. She succeeded and blazed a trail as the first black woman to win a case against a white man.

Her fierce obedience to God's call continues to be an example. She became a Methodist in 1843 and, on June 1 of that year, heard a clear call from God to become a traveling preacher speaking out against slavery. With the call came a new name from God — Sojourner Truth. It named her work of traveling and speaking the truth. When asked why she was leaving the security of a good job and housing, she said, "The Spirit calls me, and I must go." She exemplifies the courage and confidence that God will provide as we follow God's call.

Richard Allen

A part of American Methodism <u>from its earliest days</u>, Richard Allen witnessed the establishment of the Methodist Episcopal Church and saw Francis Asbury become a bishop during the historic Christmas Conference of 1784.

The first black Methodist minister, Allen was a powerful preacher and incredible movement builder. Restricted in his early years to preaching only at early morning services, Allen built congregations wherever he served. After being continually held back, Allen left his appointment and established his own congregation. As that congregation grew, he was ordained by Asbury. Eventually — after continuing to experience and witness discrimination against black members — Allen left the Methodist Episcopal Church and established the first fully independent black denomination in the United States. This year, the African Methodist Episcopal Church is celebrating its bicentennial.

Selina, Countess of Huntingdon

Lady Huntingdon became part of the Methodist movement as a member of one of its earliest expressions: the Fetter Lane Society. Though much is written about the effect of the Methodist movement on the lower classes in England, her passion was bringing the fire of revival to England's elite. In service of that goal, she appointed George Whitfield as her personal chaplain. She had him preach at dinners attended by the most influential members of British society. She also used her considerable wealth to build 64 chapels and aid Methodist efforts to serve the poor. After the Methodists were expelled from Oxford, she established a minister's training college to educate preachers. Her commitment to education inspired the founding of Huntingdon College in 1854. The United Methodist-related college is today in Montgomery, Alabama. (continued on next page)

Clementine and William Butler

Though they married later in life after he was twice widowed, William and Clementine Butler <u>played a crucial role in planting Methodism in two countries</u>. In 1856, they traveled to India, where they endured the Indian Revolution of 1857, a bloody uprising against British rule. In the aftermath, the Butlers began orphanages for children left homeless and parentless by the revolution and established the India Missionary Conference.

Returning to the United States, Clementine met with women from both Methodist and Congregational churches to encourage the support of single women missionaries. That initiative developed into the <u>Women's Foreign Mission Society</u>, a forerunner of today's United Methodist Women.

After their furlough, the Butlers traveled to Mexico. In their years there, they established a printing press, school, orphanage and several churches that offered the gospel in both word and deed. Their work and lives orbited around serving the hurting and poor.

Fannie Crosby, John Fletcher, Sojourner Truth, Richard Allen, Lady Huntingdon and William and Clementine Butler — these incredible saints are part of the great "cloud of witnesses" that God provides to help us see the path forward. No matter where we are or how we are struggling, we can recall someone else who dealt with similar circumstances.

Treasurer – It was recommended that reporting of financial status published, in the weekly bulletin, reflect a clearer representation of income. \$3,000 in apportionments (ministry shares) has been paid.

Staff-Pastor/Parish Relations – Annual Church Charge Conference is scheduled for Saturday, October 29 at 10:00 AM at Leland Community UM Church. All Annual Church Charge Conference forms are to be submitted to the District Superintendent's office by October 15. Pastor will meet with the District Superintendent on October 25; and SPRC meets with DS at 7:30 PM at Bear Lake UMC. Three people have shown interest in the custodian's job, 1 application received. All applicants must submit application by Aug. 5. Position to be filled by August 15. A SPRC meeting will be scheduled.

Trustees - "Adopt-a-Room" project going well. Nursery and trim painted by Laurie and Pat Taghon; Narthex by Sandy Mallory; Sunday school room by Candi and Mike Hasselbeck. Thanks to all! The "Time Capsule" will be completed by August 15. High on the work list are (1) repair electric outlet boxes; (2) purchase exterior trim paint for window and door frames; at the parsonage – paint exterior white trim and a \$2,000 estimate received for replacing deck; sound system needs attention; sanitizers.

Missions – The benefit dinner for Bob Manning raised approximately \$4,400 with money still coming in. July loud offering to P.E.T. Project raised \$367. Received a thank you from Church World Service for \$576 donation to the blankets+ program. It was suggested that the Missions team create a list of items that can be donated to Jubilee House.

Compassionate Care – "thinking of you" cards sent; Jo Anne asked that we keep her informed of those who need cards and/or dinners.

Pastor – He and Pastor Jane will swap pulpits on Sunday, Aug. 14; will be away from the Parish on September 4, - doing a family memorial service.

Empire Area Food "fill-a-truck – Collected \$1,500 and 18 boxes of food.

REPORTS:

Summer Speaker Series – K. Coombs: The 2016 Glen and Ella Noonan Summer Speakers Series was held on five Sundays in July. Average attendance for the 9:00 AM service was 50. Speakers' lodging (four weekends) was donated by Pat Smith and Rod Meade. Fifth week lodging was an expense item. For 2017, help is needed with advertising and mailing brochures. Possible fund raisers may be required to help finance the series. Finding musicians for special music is also required. Your prayers and financial support will be appreciated.

Finance – Roy Pentilla, Gerri Sorbie:Balance sheet reviewed (copy attached). As of this date, our projected year-end short-fall: (\$12,752). 2015 Stewardship Campaign was helpful for budgeting purposes in 2016. Plans are to conduct a Stewardship Campaign this fall. Funding for "Adopt-a-Pew" did not reach goal (-\$1,170 short). Recommend further promotion to cover the shortage.

Staff-Pastor/Parish Relations – Meredith Goodrick: Custodian hired August 15, 2016. Jim Sorbie will act as custodian's liaison with SPRC. Meeting to be on August 31 to begin work on 2016 Annual Church Charge Conference forms and pastor compensation for 2017.

Trustees – Sue Palmer: We are updating job descriptions for custodian, groundskeeper and snow plowing services. Reviewed goals to date (copy attached). Replacement of sanitizers (at a cost of \$6,000 each) will not be pursued at this time. Received a \$200 donation to purchase a new microwave for the kitchen.

Missions – Tom Petersen: Team has met goals to date (including 2 benefit community dinners). Published a list of items needed at Jubilee House (Sox Box) in bulletin and The Beacon newsletter. Published information on assisting flood victims in Louisiana through UMCOR - in bulletin and The Beacon newsletter. Print-outs of UMCOR Cleaning Kit items and Health Kit items are on table in Fellowship Hall. If you wish to donate money, cleaning kits are \$65 and health kits \$12. Please make check payable to EUMC with memo: UMCOR Advance #901440.

Worship – Pastor Russell: We Have met goals to date. A worship survey has been conducted and in the process of gathering responses. Will compile them at our next meeting. Sermon series on "Spiritual Gifts" began August 24 and will continue through mid-October. Kay Coombs will preach on September 4.

Compassionate Care – Barb Foged, JoAnne Beare: A care givers support group is being formed (new ministry). It will be led by Kay Coombs and Barb Foged and the first session will be held September 15 at 10:00 AM in Fellowship Hall. An invitation will be extended to all caregivers in the area through advertising. A "Soup Day" is planned this fall in our kitchen to prepare soups for our elders. The soup will be frozen and stocked in the elders' freezers for this winter.

Empire Area Food Pantry – Sue Palmer: Sign-up calendar for volunteers is on table in Fellowship Hall. She will call workers to remind them when they are to serve.

Hospitality – Pastor, Jan Lyon: Will be holding a meeting tomorrow at 11:00 AM for further planning. A parking lot attendant will begin November 20. The Tom and Jean Petersen have agreed to serve as hosts during fellowship hour following worship services.


