We can either hear the old story told in the new way or ignore it.

Every Christmas becomes a new retelling of the old story. It is another chance to hear God's message, and to live out God's truth again. We shall not return to Mount Sinai, or even the manger, but that is okay. Today, God is offers us a new day. In the Spirit's leading the present is a new chance to recreate God's truth within us and within our world. Today is the opportunity to know that we are called to an eternal life. The story is far from over. We have just become a part of it. This year may Christmas reveal God's truths to you.

### November 28, 2017

Meeting opened with a prayer given by Tom Petersen.

Minutes of October's meeting were read and approved.

Single Board Governance Model was presented by Pastor Russell. The Board would consist of 15 people (Pastor, Treasurer, finance, 2 SPRC, 2 Trustees, Lay Leader, Men's Group, UMW, Missions,

Worship, Music, Summer Worship, Education, Hospitality, Memorial – two year terms; meet approximately every 6 weeks. A vote was taken and passed to try this new structure. Hand-outs are available from Pastor Russell. Pastor will schedule a Church Conference meeting with District Superintendent before the end of the year.

Pastor-Parish Relations – Roger Noonan said that he will present ways to do the box luncheon which we will try to do the first part of 2018.

**Finance** – Roy reported that he is confident that we will meet budget by end of the year. Still have \$4,100 left to pay on ministry shares. Balance of \$30.418.00 of liabilities and equity. See bulletin Board for detailed report.

Trustees – no report. Pat Smith said that items for time capsule are slow coming in. She will put items on display before we seal it.

Memorial – Lots of "thank you" notes have been sent out by Barb Foged for donations.

**Missions** – Alternative Gift Giving Event report was given. Very few of our church members attended. Committee will evaluate whether we will continue event. We received a thank you from UMCOR for the \$1,490 donation we gave.

**Education** - Sunday School lessons in January will be on The Ten Commandments.

**UMW** – The annual Christmas Luncheon will be Tuesday the 5<sup>th</sup> of December. Theme is "Grandma's Apron". The group has provided 5 funeral dinners this year, sent money to Salvation Army for children to go to summer camp, supplied funds for a pastor's discretionary fund request and helped pay for new chairs for the Sunday School Room.

**Men's Group** – Next men's breakfast will be Saturday Dec. 9<sup>th</sup>.

**Hospitality** – Jan reported that greeters and ushers have name tags and she would like them to be worn. She requested approval for professional display signs be purchased to advertise the yearly events that we have. Council approved \$200 for this project.

**Worship** – Hanging of the greens special service was this last Sunday. We received positive comments about the service and the council would like to see it done again next year. The children participated and was a positive experience. The Christmas Cantata will take place on Dec. 10<sup>th</sup> & 17<sup>th</sup> with the children participating on the 17<sup>th</sup>. Christmas Eve service will be at 7:00 pm.

**Compassionate Care** – JoAnne has been sending out about 17 cards a month. Members have been delivering meals once a week for one individual. If anyone is in need of this service please call Barb Foged.

#### Other business

- Jim Coombs talked about endowment fund and how to make more interest on money.
- Annual Staff Christmas giving Postcards or e-mails will be sent to congregants and who will be collecting it.

Kay Coombs moved to adjourn and Barb Foged seconded.

**Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church** 

At the 2017 Annual Conferences, members voted to create nine districts as we come together to form the Michigan Conference of The United Methodist Church. Following *The Discipline*, it is the responsibility of the bishop to draw the lines establishing these

boundaries. Over the summer, I brought together an advisory group to help me with this task. We were guided first and foremost by the mission of the church - to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. For the Michigan Conference, we have said that we envision a conference that is Christ-centered and connected: to engage in shared mission and ministry, to support bold and effective leaders, and to nurture vibrant congregations. With nine districts instead of twelve, we are re-directing ministry share monies to help provide staff that will work with district superintendents and other lay and clergy leaders to fulfill our mission and vision.

With mission foremost in mind, we also identified other important values in forming nine districts: honoring current shared ministry arrangements;



creative possibilities for missional alignments; creativity in providing district leadership; regional identity/affinity; transportation patterns; considering resources and capacity for new districts; diversity; and connectedness.

We view the districts as serving as a primary locus for connecting and equipping local churches in the fulfillment of the Conference's mission and vision. The District will be the primary community, for both clergy and local churches, focusing on accountability to the Conference vision, continuing education, development and growth, and spiritual discernment and support.

There is still more work to be done. By the end of 2017, district superintendents will be selected, and they will begin their ministry July 1, 2018. A number of the current districts have or will be celebrating their significant accomplishments. In the spring, district conferences will be convened to name these new communities and select new leadership. In the coming months, district superintendents, district leadership, and conference trustees will select district office locations.

It is my hope and prayer that our new nine districts will be as helpful and as spirited as the districts have been in the past. I have been delighted by the work I have witnessed in our current districts and trust we will find ways to use these new districts to work out our mission and toward our vision.

Lastly, I would remind us that no structure is perfect. In the same letter where Paul tells the Corinthian Christians that their ministry of reconciliation comes from God, he also notes that "we have this treasure in clay jars" (4:7). The new district boundaries represent our best prayerful thinking. If in the future, we need to make changes and adjustments to further our mission and vision, we can and will do that. In the meantime may we, by the grace and power of God, continue to move into the future. Confident that God's Spirit is at work within and among us so that lives and the world are transformed in the name of Jesus Christ. May we work with the courage that comes from knowing that we are loved deeply, profoundly and wildly by God, by a God who wants all to see that love.

## Be an angel this Christmas - invite someone to church ...



"It is Christmas time, and there are many people who typically don't go to church but are searching nonetheless for the "good news of great joy for all the people." They've been searching at the mall, at their Christmas parties, even sitting in front of a decorated Christmas tree, but they still haven't found Christmas. And they won't find it, unless someone plays the part of the angel and invites them to come and see the child wrapped in swaddling clothes and lying in a manger."

The Advent wreath, four candles on a wreath of evergreen, is shaped in a perfect circle to symbolize the eternity of God. In some churches, four purple candles, one for each week in Advent, are used with one larger white candle in the middle as the Christ candle. Other churches prefer three purple or blue candles with one candle being rose or pink, to represent joy.

The lighting of the first candle symbolizes expectation, the second symbolizes hope, the third joy and the fourth purity. The Christ candle is lit on Christmas Eve or Christmas Day reminding Christians that Jesus is the light of the world.

Ornaments made from Christian symbols (or Chrismons, a contraction for 'Christ monograms') were first developed by Frances Spencer and the women of the <u>Ascension Lutheran Church</u> in Danville, VA. Many churches display a **Chrismon tree** during the Advent and Christmas season decorated with handmade ornaments. Our Christmas trees hold Chrismons made by Leah Edsall and her group of ladies many years ago.

Many churches hold a service of preparation for Christ's coming, which includes hanging greenery traditionally associated with everlasting life. Greens such as cedar for royalty, fir and pine boughs for everlasting life, holly symbolizing Jesus' death and ivy representing the resurrection are used.
